4. Reports from SFRR(A) Executive and 2006 Conference organiser

President : Kevin Croft

Kevin thanked everyone for attending the AGM. He congratulated Mike Davies on his election as Secretary-General of the Society for Free Radical Research (International).

Kevin told the meeting that 4 competitive travel awards had been awarded for students from SFRR(A) to attend the SFRR(International) meeting in Davos earlier in the year (August 2006).

These were awarded to Tim Harwood (Dept of Pathology, Christchurch School of Medicine and Health Sciences), Philip Morgan (Heart Research Institute, Sydney), Chong Han Ng (School of Biotechnology and Biomolecular Sciences, UNSW) and Yohan Suryo Rahmanto (Dept. of Pathology, University of Sydney). He was particularly pleased that the Society was in a sufficiently strong financial position to be able to support the attendance of Young Researchers at International meetings, and felt that it was important that this should continue.

Comments:

1) As noted in previous reports we are losing a large proportion of the NZ membership dues in bank fees (A\$10 charged for converting NZ\$ (only 1 this year)). This could be more of a problem over the coming year with fewer attendees from NZ at the Perth conference.

2) A total of \$30,000 is in a Term Deposit to take advantage of the higher interest rates available. Some money was withdrawn prior to maturity this year, primarily to finance the SFRR(I) travel awards. An admin fee of \$30 was incurred plus \$258.05 loss of interest.

3) SFRR(I) dues are payable imminently (invoice received 29/11/06): 118 members x \$5US = US\$590 (approx = A\$760). This has not been subtracted from the current balance.

These fees have been considerably higher (*ca.* A\$400 – A\$500) for the last 2 years as membership numbers have increased due to including membership in the conference registration. This will probably reduce again next year with lower conference attendance expected at both Perth and Kyoto.

4) No profit has yet been returned to the Society from the Gold Coast meeting (though see below). Kevin Croft reported that a small profit is expected from the Perth meeting, and that this will be returned to the Society once all the finances of the current meeting are resolved.

Secretary : Clare Hawkins

- Member database has been updated to incorporate the new members recruited at the Gold Coast meeting. The database that is forwarded to the Secretary of SFRR(International) only contains **financial** members of SFRR(Australasia), this year these members had the opportunity to vote in the recent SFRR(International) elections. Financial members of SFRR(Australasia) also receive a discount in the registration fees of meetings organised by other branches of SFRR (e.g. Oxygen Society, SFRR(Europe)). This database is different to the email database which contains the details of past and present members of the Society.
- Applications for student travel grants to attend the SFRR(International) meeting in Davos, Switzerland were collected earlier in the year – we received a large number of very competitive applications this year, and so it was decided to have 4 awards instead of the usual 2. Many thanks to the applicants that have already supplied a report (and photos!) for the 2007 newsletter.
- The SFRR(A) website has been regularly updated, 2007 membership forms will be available soon for download for members not attending the Perth meeting to renew their subscription to SFRR(A). I would like to again express my thanks to Geoff Kornfeld for maintaining the SFRR(A) website.
- Notices of conferences and details of new research positions in the area of free radical research have been forwarded on to the membership as they are received.
- Only one newsletter was circulated this year, if you would like more editions of the newsletter please send suggestions / articles.

2006 Conference Organiser : Kevin Croft

Kevin thanked the local organising committee and the various sponsors for helping to generate a successful meeting. He particularly thanked the two ARC Centres of Excellence (“Free Radical Chemistry and Biotechnology” and “Plant Energy Biology”) that were major sponsors of the meeting, and hoped that these relationships would continue in the future.

The approximate breakdown of the expenditure (total ~ \$36,000) for the conference was described as follows: \$14,000 – venue hire, \$7,000 - conference dinner, \$7,000 for invited speakers, \$8,000 for printing costs, poster session, drinks etc. The conference income was approximately \$40,000, with *ca.* \$18,500 of this from sponsorship. Thus, the expected profit for the meeting is *ca.* \$4,000, which will be returned to the Society.

4. Budget

Membership fees:

It was suggested by Steven Giesege that membership fees of New Zealanders that could not attend the meeting should be collected within New Zealand before transferring to the treasurer. This has been done previously, and reduces the amount of membership lost in bank fees.

Roland Stocker asked the Treasurer what the status was for current membership fees, and when these were last increased. David Pattison replied that the current Australian fee was A\$30 for full members and A\$15 for student members, and this had been the case for approx. the last 10 years. It was suggested by Roland that membership should be increased to A\$40 for full members and A\$20 for student members, with a corresponding increase in the NZ fees. On a show of hands this fee increase was implemented.

Kevin commented that with the lower conference attendance this year it would be necessary to bill 2006 members to ensure the membership of the Society did not drop, after 2 years with high membership numbers. It was also noted that this would be even more important for 2008 membership, as the attendance by SFRR(A) representatives at the Kyoto meeting is likely to be further diminished. David agreed to actively encourage previous members that were not present in Perth to resubscribe to the Society for 2007.

Mike Davies suggested that in order to encourage members to join the Society we should publicise the benefits (eg. reduced registration costs at a range of local and international meetings) of membership more widely. An entry onto the website extolling these benefits may help to increase membership. It was also suggested that hard-copy reminders that membership needed to be paid may be more effective than email reminders, as the latter are easy to delete or forget.

Student Travel Grants:

Kevin again commented that it was important to continue the tradition of providing travel grants to young scientists to local and international SFRR meetings. Mike Davies commented that while he agreed with this, the Society needs to be very careful on travel award expenditure, as this currently outweighs the income. Jiri Neuzil noted that for a Society of our size we are very generous with travel awards to these meetings. It was suggested by Trevor Mori that for the Kyoto meeting in

2007 the travel grants should be increased in value (to cover the extra costs of attending the meeting) but decreased in number. He proposed that 6 awards of A\$800 each should be awarded. This proposal was seconded by Steven Giesege, and was passed on a show of hands.

Profits from the 2005 Gold Coast meeting:

Alfons Lawen asked whether any profit was made from the 2005 meeting, and whether any of this would be returned to the Society. Jiri Neuzil replied that a profit of *ca.* \$6,000 had been made at this meeting and that 50% of this would be returned to the Society. It was commented on by several members that in previous years 100% of the profit made from conferences was returned to the Society. Trevor Mori suggested that in future, conference accounts should be finalised and any profit should be returned to the Society within a few months. Roland Stocker commented that unless the Society was prepared to underwrite any potential losses incurred by the conference organisers, the Society could not expect to claim any profits made. He also pointed out that this was of little risk to the Society, as, to his knowledge none of the previous meetings had made a loss. Following these discussions the following motion was proposed by Roland and seconded by Steven Giesege.

“For future conferences the local conference organiser(s) should liaise closely with the Society Executive with regard to the budget for the meeting, format, speakers etc, and that these should be approved by the SFRR(A) Executive. The Society would thereby agree to underwrite the meeting to a maximum loss of \$5,000, and would expect in exchange 100% of the profits to be returned to the Society.”

The motion was passed unanimously. It was agreed that this information should be included on the website to aid future meeting organisers.

6. Future Meetings

2007 - Kyoto

The venue for the 2007 meeting was confirmed as Kyoto, consistent with the flyer present in the conference bags. However, Kevin noted that he was unsure whether the advertised dates (1st – 5th December 2007) were totally definitive. He also mentioned that the organisers were running the meeting to potentially coincide with two satellite meetings on Bioactive Food Factors and Polyphenols, thus attendees of the SFRR meeting would be able to attend a second meeting if interested. Details will be confirmed at a later date. Kevin also urged as many people as possible to

attend the meeting, especially as the previous joint meeting of SFRR(A) and SFFR(Japan) was so well supported by the Japanese society.

2008 - Melbourne

Harald Schmidt (Monash University) reiterated his invitation to organise the 2008 meeting through his representative at the meeting, Courteny Judkins. Kevin suggested that Melbourne was an excellent location for the meeting, as it had not been held there for several years, and it would raise the profile of the Society to local researchers in relevant fields who do not normally attend SFFR(A) meetings. It was also suggested that it would be preferable if the conference was not held over a weekend, as has happened for the last 2 meetings.

Trevor Mori commented that attendance at the Perth meeting had been reduced due to a clash with the AHMRC meeting in Melbourne. He suggested it would be imperative to carefully decide on the dates of the 2008 meeting to avoid potential clashes with the next AHMRC and Nutrition Society meetings, although the dates for these are not yet decided.

Carl Schiesser also mentioned that there is an annual meeting of synthetic organic chemists on the first Friday of every December. This day should be avoided to allow attendance by this group. A possible venue for the Melbourne meeting is the Bio21 building where the facilities may be available free of charge. This needs to be explored with Carl Schiesser.

2009

Steven Giese reported to the meeting that the COMBIO meeting will be held in NZ in 2009 at a similar time to our normal meetings. It was suggested this may be a suitable chance for a joint meeting which could raise the profile of the Society to a wider audience.

Sydney was also suggested as an alternative venue, as it has not hosted a meeting for several years. The 2009 meeting is likely to be a joint meeting with SFRR(Japan), thus Sydney may be a better venue to encourage attendance from Japan, providing the dates for the COMBIO meeting are avoided.

A show of hands showed favouritism for a Sydney meeting. A final decision will be made at the next meeting.

International Meetings

Mike Davies updated the members with details of forthcoming international meetings being organised under the auspices of SFRR(International).

2008 – Meeting to be held in Beijing, China, 15th – 19th October.

2010 – To be held in the USA, probably in Orlando, Florida in late November.

2012 – No venue as yet. It was discussed whether the Society should bid for the 2012 SFRR(I) meeting in Sydney, but as there are at least two other big international meetings definitely or potentially occurring in Australia in 2012 this was felt to be an unrealistic option at the present moment.

6. SFRR(A) Website

Mike Davies informed the meeting that, as far as he was aware, Geoff Kornfeld was happy to continue hosting and updating the website, but asked if there were any volunteers to take over the job. No offers were forthcoming and it was agreed that the website would remain at UNSW as this appeared to be working well.

In 2007 elections for the SFRR(A) executive are again due. As the 2007 meeting will be held in Kyoto and some SFRR(A) members will not be able to attend the meeting it was proposed that electronic voting methods are used (as successfully used recently for the SFRR(I) elections) so all members can vote. Feedback was generally favourable, and Mike mentioned that the company that organised the SFRR(I) election may be prepared to do it for other organisations.

Steven Giesege asked whether the scientist profiles were being added to the website, as discussed at previous meetings. David Pattison answered that as far as he was aware there were some profiles on the website, but Clare had not received many contributions. All scientists were encouraged to send research profiles to Clare so that the website could be updated.

8. Other Business

Roland thanked Kevin and the local organising committee for a successful meeting in Perth.

Meeting was closed at ca. 6.00 pm.

Conference Reports

13th Biennial Congress of the International Society for Free Radical Research August 15-19, Davos, Switzerland.

The society for free radical research international (SFRR(I)) conference is one of the major events for international researchers working in the free radical field. Last year, the 13th biennial conference took place from 15-19 August 2006 in Davos, Switzerland. Davos is a scenic holiday destination, attracting thousands of visitors coming for its exhilarating walking in the Alps area during summer and for its challenging sport activities during winter. Davos has an international congress centre, which hosts numerous international events for visitors from all over the world. The weather in August is usually pleasant for most visitors.

Literally, you would not find a better setting to host the SFRR(I) conference.

I am honoured to be chosen to be one of the participants of the conference and the recipient of a SFRR (Australasia) travel grant. This provided me with a golden opportunity to meet up with researchers from different countries for academic exchange and network building. As a researcher, this is crucial to get work done in a more efficient way in this fast pace academic world. Given that, Australia is geographically away from other continents, the ability to network is particularly important. During the conference, I used this opportunity to talk to academics to find a suitable post doctorate position as I will finish my PhD studies this year. Talking to different people, gathering different views and opinions was a rewarding experience for me.

In general, the conference had a good coverage on diverse scientific topics, ranging from plant to animal studies and from basic to clinical and industrious research. All the keynote lectures were particularly interesting. One of the highlights was a talk on molecular biology of mammalian prions infection by Dr Adriano Aguzzi. Although the topic had little to do with free radical research, the presenter's humorous and witty style made the talk highly entertaining and yet educational. However, due to the bomb scare in London, a lot of poster and oral presentations had been cancelled and rescheduled.

After the conference, I travelled to Zermatt and Jungfrauoch, two of the famous holiday destinations for three days. The scenery was breathtakingly beautiful. Moreover, I was impressed with the courteous Swiss and the always-on-time train service during the trip. This trip to Switzerland was ended perfectly.

With support from the Society for Free Radical Research (Australasia) I was able to attend the 13th Biennial Congress of the International Society for Free Radical Research. This congress was held from August 15-19 in the Swiss Alpine resort of Davos. Typically a skiing destination, Davos still proved charming, even in the height of the northern hemisphere summer with no snow in sight. Located in the eastern corner of Switzerland, Davos was two hours by train from Zurich.

This was my first international conference outside of Australasia and proved a very enjoyable

experience. Not only did I come to realize that scientific research undertaken in this part of the world fares well against international counterparts, but that Swiss cheese fondue is nothing to write home about!

The meeting itself was large, with three parallel sessions running at any one time. These sessions were well organized and there was always something of interest to go to. I particularly enjoyed the two sessions titled “Biological Antioxidant Networks” and “Inflammation” featuring Helmut Sies, Dean Jones, Jay Heinecke and Michael Davies. I also enjoyed the keynote lectures, particularly the one given by the excitable Adriano Aguzzi on the current research being undertaken on Mammalian Prion Infections. It was not only great to hear what is going on in the field but to also finally be able to put faces to names.

From a student’s perspective, we were always kept busy with the Free Radical School and Poster sessions being held over lunch. As no food was served at any of the intervals the attendance at the poster sessions was poor, which was disappointing.

I would like to thank the Australasian Society for its support of young scientists such as myself. Without it I would not have been able to attend the meeting.

In August 2006 I had the privilege of attending the 13th meeting of SFRRI, at Davos, Switzerland; my first truly international conference (sorry New Zealand). The scientific sessions covered a broad range of free radical research areas, which was quite thought-provoking, as it showed many different ways to approach a research topic. It was good to be able to put a name to the faces of many people whose publications I'd read, but never seen, and to hear about their recent work. The lively discussions during some of the question times were very interesting, though I appreciated not being the one on the receiving end of them.

The conference was very useful, as it gave me many ideas to pursue in my work, as well as areas to steer clear of. The poster sessions were generally well attended, and I was encouraged by the interest in my poster, particularly by other younger scientists who were keen to share their experiences with various methods, and to hear of their research experiences in other countries. The main downsides to the conference were the “treat ‘em mean, keep ‘em keen” philosophy of selling morning and afternoon tea to

delegates (lots of caffeine-deprived scientists is not a good thing), not providing lunch at all, and the low attendance on the final day of the conference, which meant that the young investigator session was poorly attended.

Regarding Switzerland itself, this was my first visit to the country, and I particularly noticed the scenic beauty, neatness, efficient public transport, dogs riding in cable cars, cigarette smoke everywhere, and expensive food. Coming from drought-affected Australia the grass seemed too green to be real, but I think the most exciting botany I saw was a mushroom like the ones the Smurfs lived in; several people I showed back in Australia took some convincing that they're real (the mushrooms, not the Smurfs).

I would like to thank SFRR(A) for the provision of a travel grant, which went a considerable way towards covering my travel costs.
